



The Emblem of the College consists of a shield divided into four parts with a circle in the middle.

On the top left, there is a crescent and a star symbolic of Islamic culture and faith in future prosperity. On the right there is an open book symbolising knowledge. At the bottom right there is a lotus, the symbol for purity and prosperity. The bottom left represents a replica of Golden Rock standing for strength and striving. Inset in the mid-circle is the frontage of the College main building with a dome and minarets representing the essence of Islamic Culture: "The present is a preparation for the hereafter". Underneath the shield is a ribbon containing a verse from the Holy Quran in Arabic script followed by its translation in English, "Show us the right path" which is the motto of the college. Thus the Emblem of Jamal enshrines the ideals of cultural integration and guidance of learning and striving to succeed here and the hereafter, tempered with constant prayer to the Almighty to guide us on the right path.

The four figures in the shield are diagonally placed with Green and Yellow backgrounds. In other words our College colours consist of Green and Yellow standing for Prosperity and Happiness.

Jamal Mohamed College occupies a unique place in the academic galaxy and shines bright among the greatest academic institutions of our nation. The vision of two great stalwarts and freedom fighters Janab.M.Jamal Mohamed Sahib and Janab. N.M. Khajamian Rowther resulted in the establishment of this educational institution in 1951 with a motto to spread knowledge among the poor and downtrodden section of the society. Since its humble beginning in 1951 with the initial strength of 12 staff members and 250 students, the college has attained phenomenal progress in the academic sphere and earned goodwill among the people for providing higher education with ethical values. With the blessings of the Almighty and the support of the well wishers, the college is marching ahead towards eternal glory.

On 11th July 1951 the college was inaugurated by Hon'ble. Thiru.P.S.Kumarasamy Raja, the then Chief Minister of Madras accompanied by His Excellency, the Maharaja of Bhavanagar, the then Governor of Madras presided over the function. Over the period of 7 decades, the college was able to scale greater and greater heights and rise to the present status as a multi-faculty institution with 11 UG programmes, 11 PG programmes and 2 M.Phil programmes under Government Aided stream and 11 UG programmes and 3 PG programmes under self financing stream for men by promoting quality and excellence in higher education due to the sustained efforts and dedicated leadership rendered by the College Management Committee. The college also offers 18 UG and 15 PG programmes exclusively for women as part of women empowerment during the second shift of the college. 17 M.Phil and 17 Ph.D programmes are offered for both men and women under self financing stream.

PROFILE OF THE SOCIETY

The Society of Jamal Mohamed College is established in a sprawling land area of 87 acres (60 acres in the present location and 27 acres in Veerampatti Village near Bharathidasan University) as a religious minority institution with the primary objective of providing higher education to the down-trodden and socially backward sections of the society in general and Muslim minority in particular. Haji M.Jamal Mohamed Sahib and Janab N.M.Khajamian Rowther were the founding fathers in whose revered memory the society has been rendering excellent service in the field of higher education.

In addition to Jamal Mohamed College (Autonomous), the Society of Jamal Mohamed College has established and is administering the following institutions:

- (i) Jamal Mohamed College Typewriting Institute (2007) approved by the Department of Technical Education, Government of Tamilnadu.
- (ii) Jamal Mohamed College of Teacher Education (2007) offering B.Ed. Course approved by National Council for Teacher Education, Bangalore and affiliated to Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirappalli in 2007 and later to Tamilnadu Teacher Education University, Chennai from 2008.
- Jamal Mohamed College Ayesha Girls' Matriculation School (2009) approved by Director of Matriculation Schools, Government of Tamilnadu.
- (iv) Jamal Mohamed College of Hotel Management Industrial School (2009) approved by Department of Employments Training, Government of Tamilnadu.

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

THE LEGACY OF THE MANAGEMENT

The college was founded in 1951 and the founding Management Committee of the college consisted of Janab N.M.Khajamian Rowther as the founder President (1951-1954), Janab.M.J.Jamal Mohideen Sahib as the founder Secretary (1951-1966) and Janab N.M.K.Abdul Samad Sahib (1951-1964) as the founder Treasurer. After the sad demise of the founder president Janab. N.M.Khajamian Rowther in 1954, Janab. M. J. Jamal Mohideen had become the President in 1954. He served as both the President and Secretary of the Management Committee from 1954 to 1966 but remained as the President till 1975. In 1966, Hajee. M. J. Jamaludeen Sahib had become the Secretary & Correspondent of the Management Committee and served up to 1973.

Hajee. N.M.K.Abdul Khader Sahib who had succeeded the founder Treasurer N.M.K.Abdul Samad Sahib and become the Treasurer of the Management Committee in 1964 and served up to 1973 in that position. After the demise of Hajee.M.J. Jamaludeen Sahib, Hajee. N.M.K.Abdul Khader Sahib became the Secretary and Correspondent in the year 1973 and served until 1988 in that capacity and also decorated the office of the presidentship from 1989 to 1990.

Hajee. M.J.M.Abdul Gafoor Sahib had become the Treasurer in 1973 after N.M.K Abdul Khader Sahib. He served in that capacity up to 1989. Then he was elected as Secretary and Correspondent of the Management Committee in 1989 and held the office till 2011. He had been blessed with the unique distinction of serving as the Secretary and Correspondent during the Silver, Golden and Diamond Jubilee celebrations of the college.

Hajee.M.B.Abdullah Sahib became the President in 1975 after Janab.M.Jamal Mohideen Sahib and served in that capacity up to 1989. He also served as Secretary for one year from 1988 to 1989. Janab. N. M. K. Abdul Khaliq Sahib became the President in1989 and served in that capacity upto 1995. After him, Janab M. J. Noordeen Sahib served as the President from 1996 to 2014. Hajee.K.A.Khaleel Ahamed Sahib became the Treasurer of the Management Committee in 1989 and held the office till 2017.Hajee. M.J. Jamal Mohamed Bilal Sahib was included as a member in the Society of Jamal Mohamed College and also elected as President in 2014.

Dr.A.K.Khaja Nazeemudeen Sahib has been serving as a Member of the Management Committee from 1995 and in 2003 he was elected to the post of Assistant Secretary. Then he has become the Secretary & Correspondent of the Management Committee in 2011.

Hajee.M.J.Jamal Mohamed Sahib was included as a Member in the Society of Jamal Mohamed College and got elected as the Assistant Secretary in 2011. He served in that capacity from 2011 to 2017. After the tenure of Hajee. K. A. Khaleel Ahamed Sahib, he has become the Treasurer in 2017.

Dr.K.Abdus Samad was inducted as a Member in the Society of Jamal Mohamed College and has become the Assistant Secretary of the Management Committee from 2017.

TIMELINE OF THE PRINCIPALS

Jamal Mohamed College has grown from strength to strength under the able leadership of great men who adorned the seat of Principalship from 1951 onwards. Late.Alhaj Janab. M.J.Mohamed Sayeed M.A.,LT, was the first Principal from 1951 to 1970. Prof. E.W.P.Thomas M.A., was the Principal from 1970 to 1971. Late Hajee. Prof. E.P.Mohamed Ismail became the Principal in 1971 and held the office upto 1985.

Dr.C.Nainar Mohamed M.A.,Ph.D., was the Principal from 1985 to 1989. Prof.Hajee.N.Abdul Samadh M.A., M.Phil., became the next Principal and held the office from 1989 to 1998. Dr.K.Abdullah Basha M.A.,M.Phil.,Ph.D., was the Principal from 1998 to 2003.

Dr.M.Sheik Mohamed M.Com., M.Phil, FICWA., PGDCA., PGDFM., Dip.MA, MBA., M.Phil (Mangt), Ph.D., was the Principal from 2003 to 2011.

Dr.R.Khader Mohideen, M.Com., M.B.A., M.Phil, Ph.D., was the Principal from 2011 to 2013.

Dr.A.M.Mohamed Sindhasha, M.Com.,M.Sc.(Psy), M.Phil., M.B.A., Ph.D., was the Principal from 1st June 2013 to 24th June 2014.

Dr.S.Mohamed Salique, M.Sc., B.Ed., Ph.D., Dip. in Arabic was assumed his office as the Principal in charge from 25th June 2014 to 18th July 2014 and served as the Principal from 19th July 2014 to 31st May 2017.

Dr.S.Ismail Mohideen, M.Sc., M.Phil.,PGDCA., Ph.D. was appointed as the Principal on 1st June 2017 and he has been serving in that capacity till date.

CHRONOLOGY OF THE PROGRAMMES AND OTHER ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Jamal Mohamed College was founded in 1951, as an affiliated college to University of Madras with 250 students and 12 staff members. During this academic year 1951-1952, Intermediate programmes, B.A. Economics and B.A. Islamic History were offered for men students under aided stream. Department of Deeniyath Education was established in this same academic year. Later B.Com (Aided) was started in the academic year 1952-1953. Other undergraduate courses like B.Sc Mathematics, B.Sc Physics, B.Sc Chemistry and B.Sc Zoology were started under aided stream during the academic year 1957-1958.

The first miniature convocation was held at our college premises during the academic 1955-1956. Twenty graduates had attended this miniature convocation and were given warm reception by our college authorities. In this same academic year the construction of Burma Malaya Block was inaugurated by Diwan Bahadur Sir Arcot Lakshmanaswami Mudaliar, Vice-Chancellor of University of Madras for the accommodation of students at Khajamian Hostel.

During the academic year 1957, the college had bagged almost all prizes in the intercollegiate competitions organized by University of Madras as part of Centenary Celebrations of the University. At that time the college got the single honour of being bracketed with the thirty best colleges in India. Besides, Danforth Foundation of USA had selected our college for the award of study fellowships in U.S.A. to three of our faculty members Prof. V.Hari Rao, Prof. Devanathan and Prof.Mohamed Essa.

Khajamian Hostel for men was inaugurated in the academic year 1960-1961.

Jamal Mohamed College Alumni Association was formed during the academic year 1963-1964 and the General Library of our college (Kamaraj Hall) was inaugurated by Mr.K.Kamaraj, the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu in the same year.

The college was elevated to the status of a post graduate college and started offering PG programmes in M.A.Economics and M.Sc.Mathematics during the academic year 1963-1964 under aided stream.

Evening College was started during the academic year 1965-1966.

The College Museum was established and inaugurated by His Highness the Prince of Arcot during the academic year 1967-1968.

UG Programmes like B.A English Literature (1963-1964), B.Sc Botany (1967-1968) and B.A Arabic Literature (1969-1970) were started for men students under aided stream in the subsequent years.

M.Sc Physics and M.A English Literature programmes under aided stream were commenced in the academic year 1966-1967. Other PG programmes like M.Sc Zoology (1969-1970) and M.Com (1971-1972) were also added in the aided stream in the consecutive years.

In the academic year 1972-1973, Department of Zoology was identified and upgraded as a Centre for Advanced Research leading to Doctorate degree.

During the year 1974, the college was recognized by UGC, New Delhi to receive financial grant under section 2(F) and 12(B) of the University Grants Commission Act 1956.

Ph.D programme was started for the first time in the college by the Department of Zoology during the academic year 1974-1975.

During the academic year 1975-1976, our college celebrated Silver Jubilee on the successful completion of 25 years since its inception in 1951. The strength of the staff and student arose to 140 and 2675 respectively during that academic year. In this same academic year our college Auditorium was inaugurated by Dr.M.Karunanidhi, the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu.

The first Convocation of our college was held on 11th November, 1975 in the newly built N.B.Abdul Gafoor Auditorium.

In 1977-1978, on the recommendation of the University of Madras, UGC has recognized the college as one of the ten "Lead Colleges" in the university area. As a lead college, select programmes were started in collaboration with leading business houses and employment agencies, with a view to provide qualitative development to the colleges in the region.

Bharathidasan University blossomed in the year 1982 and our college got affiliated to it in the same year.

M.Phil Programmes in Zoology (1983-1984) & English (1988-1989) and Post Graduate programmes in M.A Tamil Literature (1979-1980), M.A Arabic Literature (1983-1984), M.Sc Chemistry (1983-1984) and M.Sc Botany (1985-1986) were started under aided stream in the subsequent years.

Self financed PG programmes were started in the august presence of the Central Minister Maragatham Chandrasekar during the academic year 1985-1986. PG Programmes like M.Sc Chemistry, M.Sc Zoology and M.Sc Physics were started for men under self finance stream during that academic year. During the academic year 1986-1987, B.Sc. Computer Science programme was introduced in the college under aided stream to meet with the advent of Computer Era. PG Diploma in Computer Applications was started in the academic year 1987-1988. Master of Computer Applications (MCA) programme was started under aided stream during the academic year 1988-1989 for the post graduate students.

The Guidance and Counselling Centre was established in the academic year 1988-1989 with a purpose to give awareness about available employability opportunities and to fine tune the employability skills of the students. Since from its inception it has been conducting coaching classes for competitive examinations and remedial classes to the students of poor, minority and SC / ST students.

Ph.D Programme in English was offered from the academic year 1989-1990.

Self Financed PG programmes in M.Sc Computer Science (1990-1991) and M.Sc Information Technology (1999-2000) were started for men students.

Overseas Chapters of JMC Alumni Association were formed in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia and Bahrain during the academic year 1991-1992.

Self Financed UG programmes for men were started during the academic year 1995-1996 and B.Sc Computer Science was offered for men under self finance stream. PG Diploma in Computer Hardware was also started in this same academic year.

In 1996, our college was selected by the UGC to offer vocational programmes in "Office Management and Secretarial Practice" at the UG level up to the year 2002.

Overseas Chapters of JMC Alumni Association were formed in Jeddah and United Arab Emirates during the academic year 1997-1998.

During the academic year 1997-1998, The Islamic Development Bank, Jeddah made a generous financial contribution towards the purchase of computer equipments and the construction of Haji Av.M. Mohamed Ibrahim Computer Centre for the Institute of Computer Studies, Jamal Mohamed College which was declared open by Prof.K.Anbazhagan, the then Hon'ble Minister for Education, Govt. of Tamil Nadu.

Ph.D and M.Phil programmes in Commerce and Economics were started during the academic year 1998-1999. Self financed M.Sc Microbiology Programme for men was also started in this same academic year.

During the academic year 1998-1999, Overseas Chapters of JMC Alumni Association were formed in Malaysia and Singapore.

Overseas Chapter of JMC Alumni Association was formed in Kuwait during the academic year 1999-2000.

The Philanthropic Management of the college felt the need for empowering women through education which resulted in starting exclusive women sections under self finance stream during the academic year 1999-2000. The classes for women section began with 4 women staff members and 150 women students in Shift-II. Initially under graduate programmes like B.Sc Computer Science, BCA and BBA (1999-2000) were offered for them. Other UG programmes like B.Com and B.A English Literature were started for women students during the academic year 2000-2001.

During the academic year 2000-2001, our college celebrated Golden Jubilee on the successful completion of 50 years since its inception in 1951. The strength of the staff and student arose to 191 and 4261 respectively. In this same academic year, Jamal Institute of Management blossomed for offering AICTE approved MBA programme and BCA programme were started for men.

The Computerized Calligraphy Training Centre was started in the academic year 2001-2002 to offer Diploma in Computer Applications and Multilingual DTP with the approval of National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language (Ministry of HRD, New Delhi). During the academic year 2001-2002, NAAC accredited the college at the Five star level for the period of five years from 12.02.2002 to 11.02.2007.

Ph.D and M.Phil programmes in Botany, Mathematics, Physics and Tamil were started in the academic year 2002-2003. PG programmes like M.Com (2002-2003) and M.Sc IT (2002-2003) were offered for the first time to the Women students.

During the academic year 2003-2004, separate sections in MBA, M.A English, M.A Arabic and B.Sc Mathematics were started for women students. Right from this academic year College Day, Sports Day, Graduation Day were conducted separately for women students. Women wings of NSS and NCC were also created in this same year.

During the academic year 2003-2004, Distinguished Alumnus Awards were presented to our alumni for the first time in the alumni meet held on 15th August 2003 at Jamal Mohamed College in recognition of their achievements in their chosen field.

During the academic year 2004-2005, JMC Alumni chapters were formed in Chennai, Calicut and Bangalore.

Ph.D and M.Phil programmes in Chemistry (2004-2005), M.Phil programmes in Computer Science (2004-2005) and Arabic (2005-2006) were started in the subsequent years.

During the academic year 2004-05, the AICTE has accorded extension of approval to the existing MCA programme offered under aided stream from 1988-1989 and under Self finance stream from 1992-1993. 3. Duration

UG Programme : 3 years; PG Programme: 2 years; M.Phil: Full Time 1 year; Part Time 2 years. Each academic year shall comprise of two semesters viz. Odd and Even semesters. Odd semesters shall be from June / July to October / November and Even Semesters shall be from November / December to April / May. There shall be not less than 90 working days which shall comprise 450 teaching clock hours for each semester. (Exclusive of the days for the conduct of End-Semester Examinations).

In each semester, courses are offered in 15 teaching weeks and the remaining 3 weeks are to be utilized for the conduct of examinations and evaluation purposes. Each week has 30 working hours spread over 6 days a week.

4. The CBCS System

All Programmes mentioned earlier shall be conducted on Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). It is an instructional package developed to suit the needs of students to keep pace with the developments in higher education and the quality assurance expected of it in the light of liberalization and globalization in higher education.

The term 'Credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in relation to the instructional hours assigned to it. However, in no instance the credits of a course can be greater than the hours allotted to it. Each Course is designed variously under lectures / tutorials / laboratory or field work / seminars / practical trainings / Assignments / Report writing etc., to meet effective teaching and learning needs.

5. Courses in Programmes

An UG programme consists of a number of courses. The term 'course' is applied to indicate a logical part of the subject matter of the programme and is invariably equivalent to the subject matter of a "paper" in the conventional sense. The following are the various categories of courses offered for the UG programmes.

Language Courses (LC) (any one of Arabic, French, Hindi, Tamil, Urdu), English Language Courses (LE), Core Courses (CC), Allied Courses (AC), Discipline Specific Elective Courses (DE), Generic Elective Courses (GE), Skill Enhancement Courses (SE) and Ability Enhancement Courses (AE)

The Language Courses and English Language Courses, four each in number are meant to develop the students' communicative skills at the UG level. Core Courses are the basic courses compulsorily required for each of the programme of study. These will be related to the subject of the programme in which the candidate gets the degree. Allied Courses cover two disciplines that are generally related to the main subject of the programme. There shall be 16 Core Courses, 8 Allied Courses and 3 Discipline Specific Elective under Part III. There are 2 Generic Electives and 3 Ability Enhancement Courses, viz. Value Evaluation, Environmental Studies and Gender Studies. Besides, 3 Skill Enhancement Courses are to be offered under Part IV. Any student can earn Extra Credits by completing a course in online during the period of study. To facilitate Advanced learners, Courses with Extra Credit are offered in 5th and 6th semesters. All the Extra Credit Courses are in self study mode and are optional.

PART-I: Language Course (LC)

The College offers Arabic, French, Hindi, Tamil and Urdu as Part-I language. An undergraduate student must select any one of them as Part-I language. He/She should earn 12 credits (3 credits per semester in the first four semesters). Part I carries 400 marks in the first 4 semesters.

PART-II: English Language Course (LE)

All the UG students shall undergo these Courses for the first four semesters. A student must earn 12 credits (3 credits per semester in the first four semesters). Part II carries 400 marks in the first 4 semesters.

PART III: Core Courses (CC)

A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a student as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.

There are 16 Core Courses, which are considered essential for each major subject. Each department will decide the title of courses. The Core Courses carry 67 total credits with 1600 marks.

PART III: Allied Courses (AC)

In addition to Core Courses, an undergraduate student must study allied courses which may help to understand the Core Courses in a better way. The students will study 8 allied courses carry 21 total credits for 800 marks.

Elective Course:

Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the student's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

PART III: Discipline Specific Elective Courses (DE)

Elective courses may be offered in main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective.

There are 3 discipline specific elective courses each of 4 credits, totaling 12 credits with 300 marks.

PART IV: Generic Elective Courses (GE)

An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective.

There are two courses - one in semester III and one in semester IV with 2 credits each. Even though it is open to all the students, irrespective of the Department, **No student** shall be permitted **to select Generic Elective Courses** offered by the **parent department.** Students have to choose Generic Elective Courses offered by other departments only.

In case of languages, the students who study Arabic, French, Hindi, Tamil and Urdu should study two courses on Basic Tamil during Semester III and Semester IV. The students who have studied Tamil in Higher Secondary School and taken other languages as Part – I, have to study Advanced Tamil during these semesters. Others will study other Generic Electives.

PART IV: Skill Enhancement Courses (SE):

The Skill Enhancement courses are skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc. These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide skill-based knowledge.

Three Courses are offered with 2 credits each.

PART IV: Ability Enhancement Courses (AE):

The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses are based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement, namely, Value Education, Environmental Science and Gender Studies. These are mandatory for all disciplines.

They include the Value Education and Environmental Studies with 2 Credits each and there is a course on Gender Studies with one credit.

PART V: Extension Activities (EA)

The Extension Activities include activities of the NSS, NCC, RRC, Youth Red Cross, Fine Arts, Leo Club, Rotaract Club, Citizen Consumer Club, Anti Dowry Association, Helping Hearts Association, Gender Club, Student Exnora, Thanneer Sutru Choolal Manavar Mandram, Drug Abolishers Association and Sports. All students have to involve themselves in atleast one of the extension services for the first four semesters. This will carry 1 credit during IV semester.

Grades will be awarded on the basis of participation, performance and behaviour. One of the Grades (A/B/C/D) shall be entered in the mark statement during semester IV as described below:

Student volunteer of the Part V Extension activities must serve minimum ten Programmes / Projects per year. Student volunteers those who are not able to full fill the requirements due to unavoidable circumstances must participate in the Extension activities programmes / projects to get the grades with in the fifth semester.

b) JAMCROP - Jamal Mohamed College Community Reach Out Programme (20UCN2JC)

Under this programme all the first year UG students have to undergo JAMCROP (in Semester I or Semester II of study period) compulsorily in collaboration with Unnat Bharat Abhiyan scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India functioning in our College. A minimum of 10 hours has to be spent in the allotted/ identified destination.

Courses with Extra Credit (EC) for Advanced Learners:

Courses with extra credit for advanced learners are introduced to enrich their knowledge. These are offered in self study mode and are optional. For UG, two Courses with extra credits during Semester V and Semester VI are offered.

Eligibility for Courses with Extra Credit for Advanced Learners:

Science Programme:

Minimum 75% Marks in the first four semesters for Extra Credit Course-I and 75% in the first five semesters for Extra Credit Course-II of Part III courses for UG.

Arts Programme:

Minimum 70% Marks in the first four semesters for Extra Credit Course-I and 70% in the first five semesters for Extra Credit Course-II of Part III courses for UG.

Note:

1. There should be no standing arrears for writing Extra Credit Courses (ie. Students should have passed all papers at the time of filling up of examination application form) 2. Students are not permitted to write the course as arrear, if he / she fails in the courses with extra credit.

Courses with Extra Credit (EC) for all the Learners:

In order to motivate all students, Extra credit courses are offered to gain more credits. According to the guidelines of UGC, the students are encouraged to avail this option of enriching by enrolling themselves in the Massive Open Online Courses (MOOC) in any subject of their choice provided by various portals such as SWAYAM, NPTEL etc. This can be availed by all students and there is no minimum eligibility to take up this course by UG students during their period of study (3 years).

VALUE ADDED COURSES FOR UG STUDENTS

Two value added courses are being offered by every department for UG students one in Semester III and another in Semester V from the academic year 2019-20. The course duration will be 30 hours. At the end of the course, an internal examination with two hours duration will be conducted by all departments. The question papers for the said examination can be set internally for a maximum of 100 marks. The question paper pattern can be decided by the respective Chairman of the Board of Studies. The valued answer scripts can be kept in the department and the grades may be awarded as per the chart given below. A common course completion certificate will be presented to all candidates who undergo the course.

Online Course (Compulsory) by MOOC

All PG students must complete one Online course offered through MOOC, during their period of study on any subject of their choice (online course under Extra credit cannot be included in this category). The defaulters can attend campus e-learning course. The content of such course can be framed by the respective Chairman of Board of Studies comprising of the lessons / units/ topics of all semesters for designing 100 multiple choice questions covering all units of the programme. An Online examination will be conducted

with a prescribed fee. Only after the declaration of the results of all semesters, a student can do the campus e-learning course. The students who fail /fail to complete the online course will loose the opportunity of getting their degrees in the stipulated period.

Extension Activities:

JAMCROP - Jamal Mohamed College Community Reach Out Programme (20PCN2JC)

Under this programme all the first year PG students have to undergo JAMCROP (in Semester I or Semester II of study period) compulsorily in collaboration with Unnat Bharat Abhiyan scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India functioning in our College. A minimum of 10 hours has to be spent in the allotted/ identified destination.

Courses with Extra Credit (EC) for Advanced Learners:

Courses with extra credit for advanced learners are introduced to enrich their knowledge. These courses are offered in self study mode and are optional. For PG, two courses with extra credit during Semester III and Semester IV are included.

Eligibility for Courses with Extra Credit (EC) for Advanced Learners:

Science Programme:

Minimum 75% Marks in the first two semesters for Extra Credit Course-I and 75% in the first three semesters for Extra Credit Course-II for PG.

Arts Programme:

Minimum 70% Marks in the first two semesters for Extra Credit Course-I and 70% in the first three semesters for Extra Credit Course-II for PG.

Note:

1. There should be no standing arrears for writing Extra Credit Courses (ie. Students should have passed all papers at the time of filling up the examination application form) 2. Students are not permitted to write the course as arrear, if he / she fails in the courses with extra credit.

Internship:

Guidelines for carrying out internship:

- A student must spend a minimum of 5 Days in an Institute/ organization/ Industry / factory and should obtain a certificate from the authorities of the concerned organization.
- A report of the visit of the internship must be submitted to the Department as the case may be in the prescribed format. Marks will be awarded for Internship as per the allotment / Visit.

6. Examinations

- i. During Semester I, it is mandatory for all the students to submit the Biodata Form during first Tutorial Class, in order to get themselves registered and for the allotment of a register number (for end semester examinations). If the student fails to register, he / she cannot continue the second semester.
- ii. All the students must submit the Autonomous Examination application forms during October to write the Odd Semester Autonomous Examinations (October / November) and during March to write the Even Semester Autonomous Examinations (April / May).
- iii. A candidate who has not passed the examination in any course(s) may be permitted to appear in such failed course(s) in the subsequent examinations to be held in October / November or April / May.
- iv. PG students are required to take up a Project Work and should submit the Project Report during the 4th semester. The procedures for the conduct of the Semester Examination and valuation will be evolved by the office of the Controller of Examinations in consultation with the Examination Committee. Classes will be awarded separately for Part I, Part II and Part III. Marks alone will be awarded for Part IV like Value Education, Environmental Studies, Gender Studies, Skill Enhancement Courses and Generic Electives. For extra curricular activities of Part V, grades will be awarded. Marks obtained in Part III Allied Courses, Core Courses, Discipline Specific Elective Courses and Project work will be taken into consideration for awarding class in the overall performance of the student with grading system.

10. Passing Minimum

For UG, COP, ADCAA and Aalim courses the passing minimum for CIA and End Semester Examination (ESE) shall be 40%. For PG, M.Phil and PG Diploma courses, the passing minimum for CIA and End Semester Examination shall be 50%.

For all programmes the ratio between CIA and End Semester Examination will be 25:75 for Theory and 20:80 for Practical Courses.

- Passing minimum for PG, PG Diploma and M.Phil (Theory & Practical) will be 50% of the marks each in CIA and ESE.
- Passing minimum for PG Project work will be 50% each for evaluation and Viva-Voce.

- A candidate who gets less than the passing minimum mark in the evaluation of project /dissertation, must resubmit the project /dissertation report. Such candidates need to appear again for the Viva-voce on the resubmitted project /dissertation.

11. Improvement of CIA Marks for all programmes (Students admitted during and prior to 2014-15 shall refer Hand Book on Autonomy-Volume V for old regulations).

- i. Students of all programmes who are unable to write the CIA Test-I with valid reason should get prior permission from the Tutor and HOD concerned and can write the CIA Test –I with a fee of Rs.200 per paper. Re-test request should be submitted to the COE's office within 15 days after the conduct of CIA Test-I. Applications submitted after the deadline will not be considered for the retest. There is no retest for CIA Test-II and also no retest for those who secured low mark in CIA Test -I.
- ii. Students who have failed in the CIA should improve their CIA in the immediate subsequent semester, by paying a fee of Rs. 400 per paper for UG and Rs. 500 per paper for PG within 20 days of publication of Autonomous Examinations results. They should submit two assignments and write two tests. Those students who fail in this attempt will have to pay an additional fee of Rs. 100 per paper / per semester. Marks secured for the attendance in the particular semester shall be considered for CIA component.
- iii. In case of PG students admitted from 2015-16 to 2019-20, shall refer the Hand Book on Autonomy- Volume VI for regulation.

12. Improvement of Marks in Passed Papers

There is a provision for students to appear for the passed papers with low marks, such students can appear for the End Semester Examinations (ie. External only) with the immediate subsequent Semester Examinations only, provided the student is without arrears till that semester (ie. Should have passed all papers at the time of filling up of examination application form). Usual fees per paper will be collected. While filling the Examination application form, student should specify the improvement details separately. Only one chance per paper will be given.

13. Revaluation

There is a provision for re-valuation, re-totalling and transparency (Photocopy) of answer scripts for UG, PG and M.Phil.

All the students, including malpractice cases, re-do cases and also out-gone students, are permitted to apply for revaluation, re-totalling and transparency for any number of courses.

14. Instant Examination

All the outgoing / out-gone students, including malpractice cases of previous semesters and also re-do cases are permitted to apply for instant examination in the even semesters to a maximum of one course (courses may be from first to final semester). All the outgone students including malpractice cases of previous semesters and re-do cases are also permitted to apply for Instant examination in the odd semester to a maximum of one course (courses may be from first to final semester).

A sum of Rs.900/- per paper has to be paid for writing Instant Examination. The Instant Examination will be normally conducted within 15 days of declaration of results of the final semester.

15. Ranking: End Semester Examination

- 1. Rank Certificates will be issued for every programme by the College for the toppers.
- 2. The Bharathidasan University conducts University Rank Examination (URE) for UG and PG for the toppers in every Programme. First Rankers of all Autonomous colleges and the top 20 rank holders of the non-autonomous colleges (having passed their examinations in the first appearance within the prescribed duration of the programme; absence from an Examination shall not be taken as an attempt) from each programme are eligible to appear for URE.
- The questions papers of the examinations comprise of objective type questions covering the Core Courses in each of the Programme generally followed by both autonomous / nonautonomous streams.

4. The top scorers in this University Rank Examination would be declared as University Rank Holders, irrespective of their grades in their respective Semester Examinations.

16. Grading

When a candidate completes his/ her UG/ PG programme within the duration of the Programme as per the University norms, grades will be awarded. When a student completes his / her UG/ PG programme after the stipulated period of the programme, the maximum Division will be only First Class with the respective grade. They cannot be considered for award of Distinction/ Outstanding categories.

Once the marks of the CIA and ESE for each course are available, they will be added. The marks thus obtained will then be graded.

From the second semester onwards the total performance within a semester and continuous performance starting from the first semester are indicated by Grade Point Average (GPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA).

Time ceiling for completion of Degree (For the Candidates admitted before 2018-2019)

The students who were admitted before the academic year 2018-2019, including Readmission / Redo cases, are allowed to complete their courses within a maximum of Five years, i.e., before 30.06.2023 in accordance with the University Communication (CCCD / BOS / C2 2018 dated 21.06.2018).

- a) If a student fails to complete the programme because of Reappear Category (Arrears), then the student can complete the programme before 30.06.2023. Equivalent course(s) with reference to the current syllabi will be identified by the respective Chairman of Board of Studies. The Coordinator, Curriculum Development Cell will facilitate the process and distribute the equivalent syllabi to the COE, HOD and the student concerned. The already secured CIA marks of the candidates shall be considered. If the students who have failed in their CIA, they are permitted to improve their marks as per the regular procedure.
- b) If a student fails to complete the programme, due to shortage of attendance, the student has to Redo the entire semester before 30.06.2023. Equivalent courses with reference to the current syllabi will be identified by the respective Chairman of Board of Studies. The Coordinator, Curriculum Development Cell will facilitate the process and distribute the equivalent syllabi to the COE, HOD and the student concerned. The already secured CIA marks of the candidates shall not be considered.

- i. The candidates who are admitted in 2018-19 or after, will be allowed to complete the UG/ PG programmes within two years after the completion of programme.
- ii. In Exceptional circumstances a further extension of one more year may be granted. The exceptional circumstances will be spelt out by the relevant statutory body.

- During the extended period, the student shall be considered as a private candidate and also not be eligible for college / university ranking.
- iv. Further, the private candidates, who apply for November session and for the subsequent examinations, they will be permitted to appear only two chances to complete their respective degree course.

M.Phil. REGULATIONS AS PER BHARATHIDASAN UNIVERSITY NORMS

DURATION

The duration of the M.Phil. programme shall be one year consisting of two semesters for the Full - Time programme, and two years for the Part - time programme. The full - time and part - time programmes shall commence from July and August. Final Autonomous Examination shall be conducted in January / February for the Full - time candidates and in April / May for Part - time candidates. The second term Examinations shall be conducted in August / September for the Full - time candidates and April / May for the Part - time candidates.

End Semester Examination (ESE)

- Each course shall have 75 marks for the End Semester Examination
- Question papers for the end semester examination of Courses – I, II & III shall be set externally and valued by both external and internal examiners.
- The guide paper (Course IV) shall be set and valued by the respective guide.
- The candidate shall be declared pass in the Courses I, II, III and IV, if he/she secures a minimum of 50% marks, each in CIA and ESE.
- The candidate is eligible to submit the dissertation only on completion of all theory papers successfully.

Improvement in CIA marks for M.Phil programmes for the students admitted from the Academic Year 2019-2020 (Students admitted during and prior to 2018-19 shall refer Hand Book on Autonomy –Volume VI for old regulations)

- i. Students of M.Phil programmes who are unable to write the CIA -I with valid reason should get prior permission from the Tutor and HOD concerned and can write the CIA -I with a fee of Rs.200 per paper. Re-test request should be submitted to the COE's office within 15 days after the conduct of CIA -I. Applications submitted after the deadline will not be considered for the retest. There is no retest for CIA -II. No CIA improvement will be permitted for those who secured 12 out of 25 or more marks.
- ii. Students who have failed in the CIA (secured less than 12 marks) are permitted to improve their CIA, on paying a fee of Rs. 500 per paper within 20 days of publication of End Semester Examinations results. Marks secured for the attendance in the particular semester shall be considered for CIA component.

Note: M.Phil. Scholars who complete the Course in more than one attempt / exceeding the stipulated programme period, will be awarded Above average with B Grade.

DISSERTATION

- Candidates shall submit three copies of dissertation (two copies to the College and one copy to the guide) not earlier than 5 months from the date of commencement of the second semester in the case of Full-time programme and not earlier than 10 months from the date of start of the second year, in the case of Part-Time programme. The minimum and maximum page limit shall be from 75 to 150 pages respectively. The dissertation may be printed on both sides of a paper and hard bound of the same is not necessary.
- If a candidate is not able to submit his / her dissertation within the period stated above, he / she shall be given an extension time of 3 months in the first instance with a penalty of Rs.1500/and another 3 months of second extension of time with penalty fees of Rs.3,000/-

- If a candidate does not submit his / her dissertation even after the two extensions, his / her registration shall be treated as cancelled and he / she has to re-register for the programme. However, the candidate need not write the theory papers again, if he / she has already passed these courses.
- An open Viva-Voce shall be conducted by both the external examiner and the supervisor and shall be attended by members of Department Research Committee, faculty members of the departments, other research scholars and other interested experts / researchers with a minimum of 30 members.

RESTRICTION IN NUMBER OF CHANCES:

Full – Time Candidates:

No candidate shall be permitted to appear for the written Examination in any Course more than twice or to re-submit the dissertation or appear for the viva voce examination more than twice. Resubmission of a dissertation shall be done with penalty fee, within 6 months from the first of the month which follows the month in which the result of the first attempt is announced. The permitted attempts of Part-I and Part-II Examinations shall be completed within a maximum period of 24 months from the first of the month which follows the month in which the registration was done.

Part – Time Candidates:

No candidate shall be permitted to appear for the written Examination in any Course more than twice or to re-submit the dissertation or appear for the vivavoce more than twice. Resubmission of a dissertation shall be done with penalty fee, within 6 months from the first of the month which follows the month in which the result of the first attempt is announced. The permitted attempts of Part-I and Part-II Examinations shall be completed within a maximum period of 36 months from the first of the month which follows the month in which the registration was done.

RE-REGISTRATION:

- The candidates shall be permitted for Re-Registration based on the merit of individual cases.
- While Re-registering, the candidates shall pay the fees prescribed for Second Semester / year.
- The Re-Registration candidates are required to submit the dissertation not earlier than six months and not later than 1 year after the re-registration. No further extension of time shall be given

Note:

- 1. Supplementary Examinations for the theory courses shall be conducted depending upon the nature of the cases.
- For detailed regulations, refer to M.Phil. regulations of Bharathidasan University in the university website framed from time to time.

- 2. The Students will not be permitted, if he writes examination with Mobile Phone and keeping the same with or without the knowledge of the Invigilator.
- All the registered papers (except project work) of the candidates will be cancelled, if they indulge in Malpractice (possession or attempt to copy) in CIA Tests or End Semester Examination of a particular semester.

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL CELL

To deal with matters relating to the redressal of genuine and valid grievances of the students concerning academic and examination related matters and also to suggest corrective measures.

COLLEGE REGULATIONS

Code of conduct for the students:

- Students are advised to come to college with formal dress and maintain decorum inside the college campus. Men students must have neat haircut and avoid wearing T shirts and Jeans. Women students must wear formal dress with shawl.
- 2. All First year UG students have to attend Students Induction Programme (SIP) for the allotted number of days in which they will be assisted to know all the facilities available in our college.
- All students of our College are strictly advised to wear Identity Card and not to use Mobile Phones inside the campus. Those who misuse the mobile phone will be handed over to the respective HOD / MID by the staff members and disciplinary action will be taken against them.
- 4. Any requisition letter addressed to the Principal must be forwarded through respective Tutor/Head of the Department concerned.
- 5. All leave applications/OD of the students must be submitted through Camu App and late application will not be considered.
- 6. Students who absent themselves in an hour during a session will be considered as absentees for the entire session.
- 7. Students who are absent for 15 days or more out of first 40 working days will not be permitted to write CIA Tests. They have to come and meet the Heads of the Department concerned along with their parents and get Re-admission by paying a prescribed fine amount of Rs.200. Only after then they will be allowed to write the tests. Those who fail to get re-admission will be removed from the roll list of the students.
- 8. Students are expected to rise from their place when the Professor enters the class room and remain standing till they are asked to sit down or till the Professor takes his / her seat.

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- 9. No student shall leave the class room without the permission of the Professor or until the Professor had left the room.
- 10. Students must not loiter around the campus or in the verandahs during the class hours.
- 11. Both Men and Women students are not permitted to go to the college office during the first hour on working days.
- 12. Any damage caused by students to college property / furniture or building will be made at their expenses and those responsible for such damages shall be dealt severely. Fine against the damage will be imposed on the entire class if the cause of which cannot be traced to any individual.
- 13. All fine amount must be paid within due date, if not it will be collected from the students along with "No Dues" at the end of the academic year.
- 14. Students who take part in communal or political activities will be severely dealt with.
- 15. Attendance in all classes including Deeniyath / Moral classes is compulsory for availing any scholarship.
- 16. Students are expected to read the messages exhibited on the College Notice Board and the website. Ignorance of any notice thus exhibited will not be accepted as an excuse for failing to comply with.
- 17. No meeting of any kind shall be held in the college campus without the permission of the Principal.
- 18. Attendance is compulsory and those who lack attendance will not be permitted to write semester examinations. Absentees without prior notice will be fined.
- 19. Students guilty of using unfair means in the examinations will be dealt severely.

- 20. Any lost property found inside campus must be handed over to the College Authorities from whom the owner can claim it promptly after proving his ownership.
- 21. a) All students must leave their vehicles only in the parking area.
 - b) Vehicles kept in and around the college buildings other than parking slot are liable to be confiscated and disciplinary action will be taken against the owner of the vehicle.
 - c) Students must bear the risk against the loss or the theft of their vehicle concerned.
 - d) Men students with vehicle must enter the college before 8.30 a.m. and exit only after 1.30 p.m. through Gate No.5 (near the Hotel Radha).
 - e) Women students with vehicle must enter the college before 2.00 p.m. and exit only after 6.45 p.m. through Gate No.2.
 - f) Besides all bike riders are advised to wear helmet and ride safely.
- 22. Stringent action will be taken against students indulging in Eveteasing as per Government of Tamil Nadu Prohibition of Eve-Teasing Act 1998.
- 23. Ragging is strictly prohibited. Those who involve in ragging of any sort shall be punished with imprisonment for 2 years and will be fined up to Rs. 10,000. (Toll Free No. 1800 180 5522)
- 24. Smoking is strictly prohibited in the college campus and those who found smoking on the campus or near the campus will be punished severely.
- 25. Consumption of alcohol and drugs are strictly prohibited inside the college campus and those who found using alcohol and drugs will be immediately dismissed from the college.
- 26. Students are expected to behave well both inside and outside of the college. They shall never indulge in activities which spoil the reputation of the college.

27. Students whose behaviour in the judgment of the Principal or any other College authority is proved to be undesirable shall be ousted from the college and their names will be removed from the roll list without any explanation.

Note: Under the Government Educational rules the Principal has full power to inflict the following punishments : * Fine * Withholding of Certificates * Suspension * Expulsion

Rules regarding the payment of fee:

Annual College fee can be paid in two installments. All first year students must pay the first installment of the college fee at the time of admission and all other students should pay the first installment of the college fee within one month from the date of reopening of the college. All the students must pay the second installment of the college fee before 31st December.

Examination fee shall be payable for each semester. Fee amount and the last date for the payment of the examination fee will be intimated by the Controller of Examinations and the same will be indicated in the Camu App.

- 1. All fees must be paid through online mode.
- 2. Fee once paid will not be refunded under any circumstances.
- 3. If a student fails to pay the fee on the date fixed for the payment, fine at the rate of Rs.10 per working day shall be levied. If the fee is not paid within the last working day of the month, his/her names shall be struck off from the roll list, and if readmitted he/she shall in addition to the fees and fine due from him, pay readmission fee of Rs.150.
- 4. Students should have receipts for all the payments they make and keep them carefully for further reference.
- 5. Students will be permitted to write the semester examination only after the submission of examination application form.

TUTOR / MENTOR

Objectives of Mentoring

A teaching staff will be assigned as a mentor for each class to look after the welfare of the students. Mentorship is the art of influencing the young students by offering guidance and counseling for becoming a wholesome personality. The mentor weaves a magic spell among the young minds and nurtures their talents for a better future. The mentor channelizes the energy of the students and brings out their best potential. Besides, in an educational environment, he bridges the gap between the students and the teachers and play supportive and advisory role for the students.

Methodology of mentoring in our college premises

- Collection of students' bio-data.
- > Compilation of Students' academic performance.
- Trace the regularity of the students and take necessary corrective measures.
- > Encourage students to have interaction with the teachers.
- Respect students' views and initiate a dialogue when it is required.
- Monitor the attendance of students and make the parents aware of it.

Roles and Responsibilities of Class Tutor / Mentor:

- 1. Shall be the care taker of his/her students in the class.
- 2. Shall offer advice on all matters represented by his/her students concerned.
- 3. Shall closely monitor the academic performance of his/her students and offer suggestion for their improvement.
- 4. Shall meet his/her students frequently and motivate them to perform better in all aspects.

- Shall inform his/her students about Library facilities, Internet facilities, Scholarships, Remedial courses, Choice Based Credit System, Part V Extension activities, Placement, Certificate courses, Sports activities etc.
- Shall recommend his/her students who are eligible for college sponsored scholarships on the basis of merit and family circumstances.
- 7. Shall inform his/her students about leave application process in the CAMU APP.
- 8. Shall represent the grievances of his/her students to the Head of the Department concerned.
- 9. Shall oversee the online payment of College Fee and Semester Examinations Fee by the students concerned.
- 10. Shall be responsible for filling up of Examinations Form by the students of his/her class to appear in the Semester Examinations.
- 11. Shall be responsible for the collection of Internal Assessment Marks and the display of Internal Assessment Marks in the Camu APP.
- 12. Shall maintain the record of his/her students.
- Shall help the students in the selection of Part I Language, Part V activity, Generic Elective and shall keep the record of the choices made by the students.
- Shall be the in charge of the community activity (JAMCROP) designed for first year UG/PG students and accompany his/her students to the village selected for community service under this scheme.
- 15. Shall meet the parents of his/her students concerned to offer suggestion and get feedback.

- 16. Shall be responsible for the circulation of all the communication (through Whatsapp group) intended for his / her students concerned issued by the College authorities.
- 17. Shall inspire his/her students and play a vital role for their personality development.
- 18. Shall inculcate ethical and moral values and prepare them as good citizens for a better future.

LIBRARY

- 1. All the students of the College are members of the library.
- The Library will be kept open from 8.00 am to 7.00 pm on all working days. On all holidays the Library will be kept open from 09.30 am to 4.00 pm except on National holidays and Sundays.
- 3. Books will be issued only on presentation of the Identity Card.
- 4. A student requiring a book for home lending can avail it by using Open Access System which is available for men from 8.00 am to 3.00 pm and for women students from 3.00 pm to 7.00 pm on all working days.
- 5. Students are entitled, to keep a book for a fortnight from the date of issue, subject to the rules here in mentioned. If the book is not returned on or before the due date, a fine of Rs.1 per day including holidays will be levied. The student will be allowed to use the library till fine is paid and the book is returned. Books due may be returned on holidays without fine on the working day immediately following the holidays.
- 6. No one is allowed to sub-lend the books taken out by him/her.
- 7. On receiving a book, Students must examine and report to the Librarian any damage found therein. Otherwise they will be held responsible for any damage that may afterwards be detected.
- 8. Absence from the college will not ordinarily be admitted as an excuse for delay in the return of the books.
- 9. All payments including fine towards the library shall be paid in the Library itself.
- 10. The Librarian may recall any book at any time.

- 11. Strict silence should be observed in the reading room.
- 12. Without previous notice, students may call for books which are marked "Reference" or a periodical for consultation which will not be lent out.
- 13. All Foreign and Indian Magazines and Newspapers will be displayed for perusal in the reading room.

SCHOLARSHIPS

A number of scholarships are awarded annually to deserving students based on the results of their latest examinations. They are tenable for the period of the entire programmes on condition that the holders continue to study in the college till the end of their programmes and that their character, conduct and attendance continue to be satisfactory.
